A fire test was held here on Tuesday afternoon. The steamer engine was tested today and pumped satisfactorily.

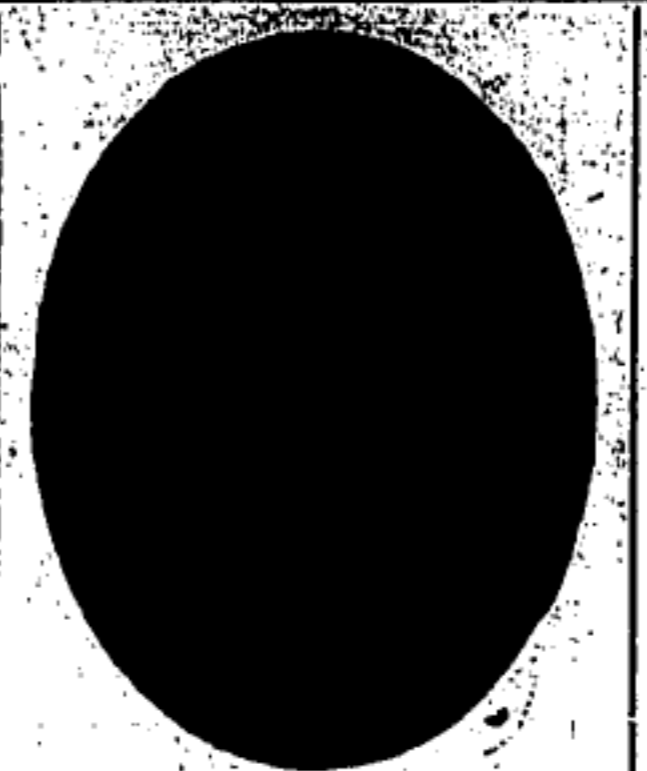
A Bad Scarer.

The Catholic Bishop of Alexandria Supports Local Option. Save The Boy The Issue.

Almont.—Twenty-four business and professional men, supported by the Almonte Gazette, have signed a statement that Local Option has not injured the business of the Town. The seven clergymen of Almonte have signed a declaration that it has been a moral boon to Almonte. This is of more value than newspaper bluff.

Renfrew.—45 professional and business men have signed a statement that unusual prosperity has prevailed in Renfrew since the passing of the Act, and recommend its adoption by other municipalities.

Stirling.—The Reeve, Councillors and all the municipal officials of Stirling have signed a statement that prosperity and morality have improved since adopting the Act. Local Option is a success in Stirling.

Owen Sound.—After a trial of Local Option for three years the electors of Owen Sound, when an attempt was made to repeal the measure, January, 1909, voted to retain it by a substantial majority. In the last four years under Local Option, the population of Owen Sound has increased 4000. This is a sufficient answer to the only newspaper out of four in Owen Sound that supports the traffic.

The Bishop's House, Alexandria, Oct. 6, 1910.

Rev. John Pate,
Lancaster, Ont.

Rev. and Dear Sir.—I beg to say that your movement in favor of Local Option has my hearty and unqualified approval. As an earnest of my sincerity, I may add that my own name is on the requisition presented to the Town Council of Alexandria. I have long noted with regret that the results of the efforts of temperance workers has not been commensurate with the energy put forth or with the hopes entertained, and I have been forced by past experience to the conviction that FUTURE EFFORTS WILL BE EQUALLY UNSUCCESSFUL AS LONG AS THE OPEN BAR REMAINS to tempt the depraved appetite of the habitual drinker and to begot and foster the appetite in the young. I appreciate the difficulties of which you speak. We have them here also. We must only trust however that the wiser part of the community will assert itself, and that soon Glengarry will know the open bar no more.

Local Option Meeting, Dec. 14th
A public meeting in the interests of the Local Option campaign will be held on Wednesday evening, Dec. 14th, in the Town Hall, to be addressed by Mr. Leroyd, of Ottawa, and Mr. W. E. Smallfield, editor of the Renfrew Mercury. An opportunity will be given to any speaker representing those opposed to local option to speak. Col. Balderston will preside.

Seizure of Muskrat Skins.
Last week Game-Inspector Phillips, of Smiths Falls, seized 81 muskrat skins trapped by George Best, of Port Elmsley. In addition to the seizure the offender was fined five dollars for each skin seized, making an aggregate financial penalty of \$405. This is a heavy price to pay for this kind of sport but if severe examples were not made for the taking muskrats out of season, the profitable side of trapping the little animals would soon disappear.

The Final Location.
The Canadian Northern Railway asked the Government on Thursday for a reversion of their Smiths Falls-Toronto route from Sydenham towards Smiths Falls. Newboro is urging that the line run through that village, which would save the company the cost of a bridge over the canal if they could use the B. W. & N. W. The Minister of Railways approved of the reversion of a portion of the way, to give Newboro full opportunity to present its case to the company.—Record.
