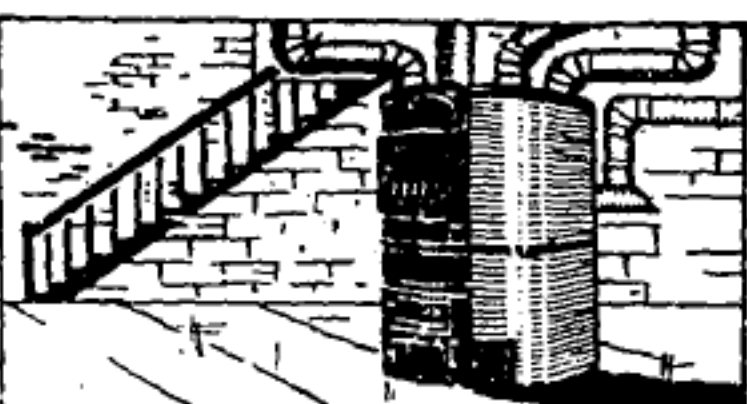

The Markets.

No Intention of Attacking Canada.

MONTEREAL, Oct. 26.—About 1,800 head butchers' cattle, 500 calves, 2,300 sheep and lambs, and 1,500 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards today. The offering of live stock at this market during this week was: 2,200 cattle, 700 calves, 3,400 sheep and lambs, 2,300 hogs. Prime beefs sold at from 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c per lb. but they were not choice. Feisty good animals, 7 1/4c to 7 1/2c to the common stock, 3 3/4c to 5c, and the best animals, 3 1/2c to 4c per lb. Calves sold at from 4 to 5 1/4c per lb. Sheep sold at from 4 1/2c to 5 1/4c per lb. Lambs at 7c to 7 1/2c do. Good lots of hogs sold at from 7 1/4c to 8c per lb.

Although Germany contends that Canada, by sending troops against Germany, has violated the spirit of the Monroe doctrine, Germany has no intention of attacking Canada, nor attempting to colonize the Dominion, according to this statement issued at Washington on Monday by the German embassy. The German point of view is that by joining in the European war Canada has put herself outside of the pale of the Monroe doctrine. But Germany has no intention of attacking Canada or colonizing Canada. This is an amplification of the view expressed by Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, that by taking part in the war Canadians justified an aggressive campaign against themselves.

PERTH TOWN COUNCIL.

Patriotism was the broad theme at the special meeting of Council on Wednesday morning. When some routine matters had been disposed of, Perth's position in the patriotic fund was discussed, when it was decided to hold a public meeting on Monday evening. Council will likely make a substantial grant, to be supplemented by private subscriptions organized at the meeting.

Then Council took up another patriotic matter—the task of getting a line on the Canadian Electric and Water Power Co., as to their intentions in supplying lights to their customers. The company can only supply power for a few hours each night, because the water is low, but it is held that they can install a steam auxiliary and thus give almost continuous power and service. The Mayor named a committee to get "light."

Mayor Grant presided with the following quorum present: Reeve Foy, Dep. Reeve Wilson, Messrs. Shaw, Hall, Mendels and McCann. The Perth Horticultural Society petitioned to be relieved of payment for the use of the Town Hall on Oct. 15th, when the society held a flower show.—Granted on motion of Messrs. Hall and Foy.

W. J. Rabb asked for the return of his deposit check, as contractor of Grant street sewer. The work was completed three months ago.—Ordered to be returned on motion of Messrs. McCann and Hall.

Chairman Shaw read the Finance Committee report, which, being adopted recommended payment of the following accounts:—

The following accounts were ordered paid on motion of Messrs. Wilson and Mendels, charged to sewerage:— Jno. White, labor, \$1 14; W. Perry, 38 00; T. O'Connor, 32 00; Geo. Cornell, 4 00; P. Bennett, 12 00; A. H. Keays, supervision, 6 00; James & Reid, supplies, 74 25; Allan & Cooper, blacksmithing, 4 25.

An order was granted on the treasurer, on motion of Messrs. Foy and Mendels, for \$2,000 in favor of John Carroll and charged to granolithic account.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

Major Grant brought up the question of Perth contributing to the Patriotic Fund. He had written away for particulars of organization, and expected to have these before a public meeting was called. Coun. Hall—We have been remiss in our duty towards this fund, but we will have to take hold of it and push it ahead, the same as the other funds were handled.

Coun. Shaw—it will be necessary for Perth to take a stand in this matter and contribute largely and generously to the Fund. I would favor calling a public meeting, and organizing for a whirlwind campaign. And I think the Council should also make a substantial grant.

Reeve Foy.—It doesn't require a meeting to influence me in asking Council to vote a grant of money to this fund.

Let Council of its own initiative make a grant, which can be supplemented by citizens.

Coun. Shaw said this was his idea. Coun. McCann favored the holding of a meeting, and after a subscription list was circulated, it would be time enough for Council to make a grant.

Town Clerk Kerr suggested a public meeting be held, which meeting could pass a resolution asking Council to make a grant.

Reeve Foy.—It does require the consensus of opinion of the public meeting to make or induce me to make a grant. He would do it of his own accord and on his own responsibility as a member of Council. They were putting the cart before the horse, and would find that the same generous people who had contributed to other schemes would be doing the heaviest contributing to this fund. On the other hand, in the grant Council made, all would bear a share. He favored Council making a grant, which could be supplemented by subscriptions of private citizens. By all means have a meeting.

Coun. McCann contended that there were a number of men who would give more generously to the fund, if Council did not make a grant, but if Council voted a grant, they would cut down their donations.

Reeve Foy.—There are a few who are always shifting their burdens to some one else. They are good shunters. This matter was dropped for the time being, on the understanding that Council would meet again on Friday evening and Mayor Grant call a public meeting for Monday evening.

POOR SERVICE OF LIGHT.

Mayor Grant then short-circuited Council to a discussion of the electric light question as it affects many business men and householders in town today. The Canadian Electric and Water Power Co. were not supplying light, and the Mayor wanted to know if the town was going to be held up by the company. Admitting the water supply was low, there was no reason why the company couldn't put in a steam auxiliary plant and generate enough power to supply their customers. Smith's Falls runs an auxiliary.

"We've been held up by the company long enough," said his Worship. "Down at Winchester, Chesterville and Morrisburg, they have the hydro-electric system, and I think we should make a serious move here to the best solution is to buy out the company."

Mayor Grant.—The street lights can't run all night all winter.
