

TRENCHES ARE GRAVES

Germans Cover Them With Earth When Filled by Dead.

In France, Oct. 26-I have spoken with efficers who assure me that very often the British, after driving out the Germans, do not care to occupy the trenches. They are simply places of horror. Some of them have becomerenches of dead. The Germans unable o remove their dead, are nevertheless receiving constant reinforcements and accordingly as they also fall fresh ones come on until the trenches are filled up with dead. Then they simply fill up the trench with ground to the top, and it becomes a grave, in which five or six hundred men lie buried.

"It is a great extraordinary thing," said an English officer, speaking of the English trench," to see soldiers lying in their straw sound asleep when German shells are bursting all over their. I have seen men keep on sporing even after a shell burst within five or six yards over their heads, and half filled their trench with fresh earth."

Another officer sold me that he counted three shells that burst over a man's head while he was trying to light a cigarette, and the shell each time blew his match out He merely indulged in a strong exclamation and calmly lit anoth-
