Losses An Eye in Accident. Carp Review—Miss Agnes Fulton of Pakenham had to have an eye removed in the Civic Hospital, Ottawa, recently. She received serious injury when a horse she was driving shied and ran away, throwing her out of the buggy onto the road.

Retiree Mercury—Mr. Wilfred Scharf, who contracted to build a foundation for the soldiers' monument on Low Square, had his agreement amended to go down another foot, making the mass of stone and cement reach to six feet below the surface. The base has now been completed, and next year the imposing superstructure will be set up by a Toronto firm.

They also spent a very pleasant afternoon at McDonald's Corners Fair, meeting many friends, some of whom they had not seen for years, as it is over 27 years since Mr. and Mrs. W. M. and Mrs. H. B. Purdon attended the Hill Fair. They were surprised to see such a wonderful display of everything in the agricultural display.

Periodical Visit. Renfrew Mercury—Mr. B. J. McDermott arrived in Renfrew on Tuesday evening from Montreal, coming to pay one of his periodical business visits to Renfrew. Having resided here for nearly a score of years, Mr. McDermott has different business connections with the town and his country roundabout. He finds that his acquaintances here grow fewer with the passing of the years, but recognizes that nothing can be more natural and inevitable. As usual he looks but little different since going away from here a score of years ago.

New Car Ferry Due. Brockville Recorder and Times—The new tug and car float which was constructed during the past summer for use on the Ogdensburg-Prescott route are expected to arrive this week. The tug was built at the Laurion yards near Quebec and is called the Prescott, while the float will be known as the Ogdensburg. The steamer Charles Lyon, which has been operated on the car ferry for the past 20 years, will be retired when the new vessels are placed in commission. The float will have three tracks, accommodating about 24 cars.

Changed Their Residence. Smiths Falls Record—News—Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Brinkman who disposed of their business here lately, have moved to Fitzroy where the former has a good position. Prior to their leaving, the local Women of Mooseheart Chapter 567 assembled after their regular meeting to bid farewell to Mrs. Brinkman who is recorder of this chapter and presented her with a beautiful silver basket, as a token of their appreciation and good wishes. Mrs. Brinkman expressed regret to sever her connections with the ladies of the order and her sincere thanks for this handsome gift.

A Gracious Act. Carleton Place Herald—The management of the N. L. Agricultural Society did a very gracious thing when they sent Mrs. Murphy, the mother of the Children's Shelter, an official invitation for herself and children to attend the annual fair. From other sources there were contributions to enable the little ones to enjoy the amusements on the side, and unconsciously Joe Patterson filled in the gap to complete the circle when he offered to transport the children to and from Almonte. It was a great day for the kids and all concerned felt their troubles had been more than amply repaid.

Tea Caddy Over 150 Years Old. Cornwall Freeholder—Manufactured in the day of King George III, when tea was still a luxury and sold for ten to 25 shillings per pound, a tea caddy of intricate design has been in one family for 150 years and is now the property of Mrs. Robert Kerahaw, 120 Amelia street. This genuine antique which Mrs. Kerahaw received from her great-grandmother, has two compartments, one for tea and one for sugar. In the time it was fashioned, sugar was nearly as expensive as tea, presumably selling for about 20 shillings a pound. The trimming consists of straw work in geometrical design. The value of both tea and sugar at the height of the eighteenth century is testified by the well-made lock inserted in the side of the tea-caddy in mid-Victorian times, a tea-caddy with a pound of tea made a very handsome present.

Interesting Statistics. Renfrew Mercury—Certain Government statistics issued recently at Toronto give the rural area of Renfrew County as 1,492,387 acres as against 1,006,954 in Lanark and 950,847 in Carleton. Farm buildings are highest in value in Carleton county, with Renfrew second and Lanark third. Renfrew county is not a leader in any other respect, is an agricultural way, except in the number of sheep kept, those of Renfrew county showing a total of 69,866, Lanark 42,933 and Carleton 26,235. Lanark county has almost twice as many silos as Renfrew, while Carleton has more than Lanark. In the number of orchards Renfrew is low, but second in the matter of small fruits. The cattle of Renfrew county exceed in value those of Lanark but are below

those of Carleton. Here we are leaders in the matter of sheep and ranch cattle.

New Telephone Exchange. Arnprior Chronicle—The people of Fitzroy may be interested to learn that on Saturday night last at midnight the Bell Telephone Company in Montreal put into service the new Fitzroy dial system telephone exchange. About 5,000 telephones which were formerly operated on manual switchboards were transferred to the dial method of operation practically in an unobtrusive manner.

The dial system of operation is commonly known as automatic. The name Fitzroy was chosen for the new exchange from many names which were considered. Any name which has D, E, or F for the first letter and G, H or I for the second letter was considered so there were many names from which the choice was made.

The new Fitzroy exchange will serve nearly 10,000 telephones eventually and by the end of the year some 110,000 telephones in Montreal will be dial-operated which is about 55 per cent of the total number of telephones in the city.

Early Showing of Pictures. Pembroke Times—Mr. J. H. Bruck, General Manager of the O'Brien chain of Theatres, is to be complimented upon the early showings he has secured of some of the latest pictures. As a matter of fact most of the pictures shown in the past months are very recent releases.

"Song O' My Heart" was released in New York on Sept. 7th and shown in Pembroke on Sept. 19th; "Queen of Hearts" released in New York August 23rd and shown at the O'Brien on Sept. 10th and "The Devil's Holiday" released in New York May 24th shown in Pembroke June 30th. On Monday, Pembroke O'Brien Theatre had the distinction of being the first theatre in Canada to show "Scarlet Pages" starring Elsie Ferguson. This picture was released and shown for the first time in New York only the day previous. In the ordinary course of events in film distribution this could have been impossible, but Canadian Film exchanges are becoming very anxious to give Canadian theatre goers an early showing of the new pictures and have the films printed in Canada, making their release in Canada weeks earlier.

Late Thea. Pink's Plant. Pembroke Times—An announcement is made of some important changes in the local plant of Canadian Wax and Pink Ltd., (formerly the Thea Pink Co. Ltd.)

The machine shop is being taken over by Mr. Phineas Patterson, who for a number of years has been in charge of the local plant, and it will be known hereafter as the Patterson Machine Works. Mr. Patterson will continue to operate the machine and blacksmith shops and the acetylene welding plant on the same lines as formerly, and will endeavor to expand the business. He is well and favorably known to the trade and should meet with success.

For the present at least the forgings department of the local Warren-Pink plant will be closed down, and all forgings will be made in the plant at St. Catharines, Ont., but the factory at St. Catharines is being offered for sale, and if and when it is disposed of the equipment will be moved to Pembroke and all the firm's manufacturing will be carried on here with the exception of an assembling plant at Vancouver, B. C., where their products are assembled and shipped to points in Western Canada.

Horse Race Action. Pembroke Times—In the case of Sharpe vs. the Arnprior Agricultural Society an action tried at the June session of County Court, before His Honor Judge J. T. Mulcahy, and in which judgment was reserved, a decision was given out on Thursday.

The case was one in which William Sharpe, of Fort Coulonge, sued the defendant society to recover monies won by his horses in the races at the Arnprior Fair, the society claiming that Sharpe had violated the rules of the Canadian Trotting and Pacing Harness Horse Association, and on this grounds refusing to pay the amounts claimed by Sharpe. His Honor finds that defendants were not justified in withdrawing the money on the grounds stated, and gives judgment for the plaintiff for \$236.87, together with costs. In the case of one of the horses which ran at the fair, and which Sharpe had purchased only the day before the judge says the matter of the horse's eligibility should be decided by the rules of the society, and if it cannot be thus decided, the plaintiff may bring action in the proper court after the matter has been dealt with by the association. The sum of \$12.50 is involved in the dispute over this latter point.

Death Accidental. The coroner's jury at Smiths Falls on Friday night, empaneled to inquire into the tragic death of C. P. R. Conductor Elwood Woodmark, who was killed on Wednesday morning when he fell beneath the wheels of C. P. R. passenger train No. 37 at Smiths Falls station, returned a verdict of accidental death at the request. Witnesses stated that Mr. Woodmark had apparently misjudged the speed of the train as it drew into the station and had stumbled in jumping off.

Obituary

Jackson—In the death of Miss Mary Jackson, daughter of Benjamin Jackson, South Elmsley loses a life-long resident and one who was held in highest esteem by a wide circle of friends who will deeply regret her passing. She was late Miss Jackson was sixty-one years of age and her entire life had been spent in the district about Lombardy. She had been in ill-health for the past two years but was taken to the Public Hospital only on Wednesday, September 24th, passing away on Thursday. Deceased was well known in Lombardy and throughout the township of South Elmsley and widespread regret is occasioned in her passing. She leaves to mourn her loss, besides her sorrowing father, two brothers, Charles of Winnipeg; Ben, of Fort Elmsley, and one sister, Elizabeth at home. The funeral, largely attended by relatives and friends was held from her late home in Lombardy on Saturday afternoon, Sept. 27th at Trinity church where services were conducted by Rev. Mr. McGregor. Interment took place in St. John's Cemetery in Smiths Falls.—Record-News.

Munroe—The following is from the Waba correspondence in the Arnprior Chronicle: "Once again the Angel of Death visited our community on September 14th and claimed into his town a well-known and respected citizen in the person of the late Mr. Richard Munroe; one of the oldest pioneers of this district, having reached the ripe old age of 79 years and having been blessed with a rugged constitution until some five years ago when he had to give up his blacksmith and workshop. He had been faithful in that capacity to the public and will be greatly missed by the surrounding district where Mr. Munroe diligently worked at all hours. He was born in North Burgess; some 68 years ago he claimed for his bride, Margaret Ann Duncan of North Gower. They were married

by the Rev. Mr. Pettred, Anglican minister and for many years they resided in the Scotch Line, later moving to Waba where he carried on his business with success. Only eight years ago they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. The late Mr. Munroe who had been confined to his bed at times for the past five years with an illness, suffered greatly at times but bore his pain with patience and was always bright and cheerful. Deceased had been a staunch Orangeman of Montague Lodge, a faithful attendant; later belonged to the White Lake Lodge; in religion a Presbyterian. Deceased was one of a large family of twelve of which but three remain; he leaves to mourn his sorrowing wife, two sisters and one brother, namely, Alex. of Pembroke; Mrs. R. Davison, of Smiths Falls and Mrs. George Moodie of Perth. The funeral took place on Tuesday, September 16th and was largely attended by his last resting place in the family plot in Palmerston cemetery. The services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Brown of White Lake, both at the house and at the grave, assisted by the Orange order with Mr. John Ledgerwood, assisted by Mr. Little of Arnprior. The pallbearers were Messrs. John Ledgerwood, D. Duncan, Walter Barr, R. Duncan, A. Johnston and Melvin Munroe. A large profusion of flowers were placed on the casket which included wreaths from the Orange Order and from the family. The deepest sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved wife and friends in their hour of sorrow."

Dunoon—His many acquaintances in Perth and district will be grieved to learn of the death in Lindsay on Thursday October 2nd of Mr. W. G. Dunoon, a former resident of Perth when he was engaged as a druggist with Mr. J. F. Kellock in the present stand occupied by Mr. W. S. Robertson. While here, Mr. Dunoon was a member of the then Knox Church, and Fraternity Lodge, I. O. O. F. He was highly popular and greatly esteemed here. The Lindsay Post refers as follows to Mr. Dunoon's death: "William George Dunoon, for years a prominent druggist in Lindsay, died at five o'clock Thursday morning in Ross Memorial Hospital, after a two weeks' illness. Born in Lindsay, the late Mr. Dunoon spent his boyhood here, and attended local schools. In 1884, having finished his necessary course he entered his drugist apprenticeship with Mr. Sam. Perrin, who at that time owned a drug store in Lindsay. At the end of four years he entered the College of Pharmacy at Toronto and completed the course at the end of two years. In 1892, Mr. Dunoon accepted a position with J. F. Kellock in Perth, having worked for two years in Toronto immediately following the completion of his school term there. Working in Perth for several years, he left that town and came to Lindsay where he opened a drug business of his own, and has been here since that time. One of the older members of Fraternity Lodge No. 264 Independent Order of Oddfellows, of Perth, the late W. G. Dunoon passed through all the various chairs of this Lodge and was a Past Grand of the Order. When he moved to Lindsay he immediately identified himself with Lindsay Lodge No. 100 and was an active, faithful and consistent worker in the many activities of this Lodge. He has also been a member of the Faithful Brethren A. F. and A.M. Lodge No. 77, since 1907 and a member of the Canadian Order of Foresters Lodge No. 125 for a number of years. Join-

ing the Progress Club at the time of its organization a number of years ago, Mr. Dunoon was an active member and took part in a great many of its activities. He was also a charter member of the local Kiwanis Club. Surviving him are his wife Mrs. W. G. Dunoon formerly Hattie Mimms; a daughter, Margaret; one brother, Mr. David Dunoon, and one sister, Miss E. Dunoon, all of Lindsay. His father, Mr. David Dunoon, sr., died three years ago at the age of 95 years. Formerly a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church here, Mr. Dunoon has been a member of First United Church since Church Union some years ago, and was an elder in the latter church at the time of his death." The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon in Lindsay, interment taking place in Riverside Cemetery.

Miskelly—Mr. Fred W. Miskelly, one of Smiths Falls best known citizens and a lifelong resident of this district passed away suddenly at his home in Brockville street in Smiths Falls on Saturday evening. The late Fred Miskelly was born at Smiths Falls fifty-seven years ago, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. Miskelly, of Smiths Falls. He was prominent in the business life of Smiths Falls, where he conducted a

successful tinmithing and plumbing business on Main street. Besides his widow, who was Miss Annie Bullford, of Chantry, Ont., deceased leaves a family of four daughters and one son, namely, Miss Lillian Miskelly in Ottawa; Miss Irene Miskelly, Smiths Falls; Mrs. James Meade, of Smiths Falls; Mrs. Waagner (Margaret) in Hamilton; and David Miskelly at home. He also leaves three brothers: Mr. George Miskelly of Smiths Falls; Mr. Herb Miskelly of Winnipeg, and R. J. in Saskatchewan, and a sister Eva in Winnipeg. The late Fred Miskelly was a member of various fraternal organizations including the Masonic Order, Rideau Lodge No. 241, I.O.O.F., and Chimes Rebekah Lodge No. 156, I. O. F. as well as the Orange Order. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon under Masonic auspices, Rev. Dr. Semple conducting the service at the late residence of the deceased.
