C. P. R. Conductor Instantly Killed

Elwood Woodmark, Fall-Smalls Passenger Train at Smiths Falls on Which He Was Conductor.

(Smiths Falls Record-News)

Elwood Woodmark, well known C. P. R. conductor, was instantly killed at 11.10 o'clock Wednesday morning in a tragedy which occurred before the eyes of many horrified spectators...

Railway employees and many passengers who were waiting trains at the depot were horrified to see Mr. Woodmark step from No. 37 as it pulled into the station at 11.10 o'clock...

The wheels passed over his shoulder and throat, completely severing his head from his body and he was instantly killed. Coroner Dr. C. L. B. Stammers was called immediately...

Witnesses were unanimous in agreeing that the tragedy was purely the result of an accident and it was evident that Mr. Woodmark's death occurred simply because he misjudged the speed of the train as it pulled into the station.

The late Mr. Woodmark began rail roading in the C. P. R. yards here in 1887, shortly after the opening of the O. & Q. and had risen from the ranks to the position of conductor. He was conductor for some time on the Perth-Montreal local but in recent years had been on the Montreal-Toronto run and was considered a most capable and efficient official.

The late Elwood Woodmark was a lifelong resident of the district and his untimely death will be sincerely regretted. He was well known and popular among his fellow employees and had numerous friends in Smiths Falls and the entire district who will be shocked to learn of his sudden passing.

Regular Meeting Town Council

The regular meeting of the Perth Town Council on Monday night was a brief one. Mr. T. A. Rogers was voted to the chair in the absence of Mayor Devlin, and the members present were Messrs. Grant, Poole, Relyea, Burns, McParlan and Patterson.

A motion was passed setting October 27th as the date of the holding of the Court of Revision. Mr. Rogers stated that he noticed in the gallery several gentlemen who had brought in complaints against the Chief of Police at the last meeting of Council. The Police Commission had met on Thursday night following the meeting to hear the complaints. Mr. Rogers said that he had been handed the evidence in the complaints on Monday during the noon hour, and a report would be handed in to the Council at the next regular meeting.

Councillor McParlan stated to Council that during the past few weeks his name had been drawn familiarly into the charges in question, and he wanted to say that the reports concerning him were entirely false. He said that he was not implicated in the charges in any shape or form with the exception of introducing Mr. Haughlan to the Council. He wanted to make his position clear, and said that there were no strings attached to him in this matter.
