Scotch Line Native Predicts War in 3 Years' Time

Dr. George E. Wilson, native of the Scotch Line and son of Mr. and Mrs. George Wilson, gave the following interesting address as reported in the Saint John, N. B. Times-Globe, of March 24th:

"War is coming and possibly within three years," declared Dr. George E. Wilson, professor of history at Dalhousie University, Halifax, in an extension lecture, delivered in the Admiralty Hotel under the auspices of the Dalhousie-King Alumni Association of Saint John. "Can Europe Keep the Peace?" was his subject. "Apparently it cannot," Dr. Wilson stated, "because great preparations for war which are now going on are quite similar to the warlike activities which preceded the Great War and only a spark now seems necessary to start anew a conflagration involving the nations of Europe in a struggle." Mr. Justice Tilley, president of the Association, presided.

Outlining some of the dangers threatening peace, the speaker stated that foremost among these were the fact that the people are unwilling to face actual facts, the dangers of patriotism and the general attitude towards war.

The rise of the national state was the important development since the end of the 15th century, he declared. At first England, France, Spain and Portugal were the great national states, but now the national state is developing in every part of the world. The speaker declared that rights are being subordinated to the state and instanced life in Russia, Italy and Germany, where the rights of the individual in the present era are criticized as "to the greater interests of the state. Even in our own country in times of war, a somewhat similar condition prevails," Dr. Wilson said.

"It is often said that a state has various interests, but I would like you to think that the state has only one policy, that of self interest, of getting along."

League Does Much Good.
"The new dispensation in European politics came in 1919 with the setting up of the structure of the League of Nations, but the countries of Europe did not desist from playing their old game," declared Dr. Wilson. Much good has been accomplished by the League since its formation, the prevention of small wars and the reduction of friction between the great powers which might have led to serious consequences.

"I believe that much harm has been done during the last 15 years by people saying 'Let the League attend to it.' In the case of the present conflict between Italy and Ethiopia, Dr. Wilson pointed out that the battleships in the Mediterranean Sea were not the property of the League but belonged to Britain and that it was the latter country which backed up the League in its endeavor to preserve peace in Africa."

He mentioned "the lukewarm attitude of France to the League in 1919, an attitude which afterwards changed, he stated, because France came to believe, that the League was the best guarantee for preserving the status quo in European politics."

Treaties made at the end of a war are usually dictated by the victorious powers, who present them to the vanquished nations. "Naturally, victorious powers believe these treaties are sacred and once you write them on paper they cannot be changed. The world is not static and the history of European nations seems to point to the fact that you cannot change such treaties without resorting to war," he stated.

The speaker reviewed the general attitude toward war among the various great powers, asserting that in the United States the general opinion was that Americans do not want to fight or participate in a war. In Great Britain, the government does not desire war and is willing to make concessions to avoid a conflict. In France much the same attitude prevails, while Russia is opposed to war at the present time, "maybe will not be ten years hence."

Italy Confident

Turning to Italy, the speaker stated that the Italian nation feels that it is in a first rate power and wishes to push ahead acquiring colonies and a greater share of material progress.

"Japan is in a similar position" he said, "while in the case of Germany there is a distinct attitude and determination among the people that they will not be humiliated; here we see a situation quite similar to 1912 with the nations believing that a war is coming, and preparing."

He mentioned the alliances which seem to be forming in Europe and "the tremendous sums of money which are being spent in war equipment." The speaker stated that on the other side of the picture were counter-balancing factors such as the lack of preparations on the part of some nations and the feeling that to victory or defeat must be added a third alternative, revolution, "which would surely follow another war."

Another factor was the remembrance of 1914 and "while 95 per cent of the people want peace, the same number fear that a war will break out," he said.

Dr. Wilson, who has travelled widely in Europe, spoke of some of his experiences there on a recent trip, mentioning that in Germany two things were noticeable—the desire of the people to talk to one about their affairs and their great enthusiasm for Herr Hitler. "Germany is extremely poor," he said, "and everything is being done to bring the people to a fighting pitch with extensive preparations for war being carried out." He expressed the opinion that Italy and Germany are dissatisfied with their lot and that there will be a growing friendship between Hitler and Mussolini.

Following the address, a general discussion took place and several questions were answered by Dr. Wilson. A vote of thanks was extended to the speaker.
