LOCAL MATTERS.

For Ottawa, Labor Day.

The Citizens' Band of Perth have been engaged for the Trades and Labor demonstration in Ottawa on Labor Day.

Larger Stable Accommodation.

Mr. John Cameron, the well known breeder of Holsteins, has built a large addition to his barn, and on Friday last the "raising" was held. There were about forty neighbor farmers present, and the usual rivalry and sport that obtains at barn-raising was present at this one. When the new addition is completed, and other improvements contemplated are finished, Mr. Cameron will have a large, modern and equipped barn and stable.

Tore Holes in Woman's Shoe.

Mrs. Sims, of Westport, had great holes burned by lightning in the shoe on her right foot, and her stocking into shreds, but the foot only slightly burned. Mr. and Mrs. Sims and their child were sitting at the door watching the storm when the bolt struck them. All three were rendered unconscious. The father and baby boy were not hurt and recovered in a moment. Mrs. Sims' escape was miraculous. One-half of the shoe was almost all burned away, while the other half was untouched. The child's cot was burned slightly, and a hole knocked through the back of the house.

Suffering From Broken Ankle.

Mr. Hugh S. Robertson, of the Stratford Normal School, is confined to his home suffering from a dislocated and broken ankle. On Friday last he drove out to the Ferry for a day's fishing, and while stepping out of the buggy, the horse stepped up, and Mr. Robertson was tossed to the ground, breaking and dislocating the right ankle bone. The pain is intense. The horse then bolted, and still attached to the buggy, cleared a five foot wire fence without breaking the top wire. A run around Mr. Sam Hall's field was made in record time, and the horse then attempted the wire fence again, but failing to clear it, horse, harness and carriage became entangled in the fence.

Jumping Trains.

The practice of jumping the C. P. R. trains by boys and men from Smiths Falls and vagrants in general goes on apace, notwithstanding the number of serious and sometimes fatal accidents. Saturday night Chief Griffith nabbed Joseph Woodmark, better known as "Bunny," on the blind end of the baggage car. Sunday night Geo. Hall, a vagrant, was collared on the express. Two of his companions got away. Both appeared before Magistrate Taylor on Monday morning. Hall got six months in the Central, and Woodmark was fined \$15 and costs or one month in jail. He tried his friends by phone, but being unable to raise the needed, went to the house on the hill on Tuesday. Woodmark is a nephew of the man now in jail awaiting trial for the murder of his wife.

Mr. Gamble's School Picnic.

The annual picnic of Mr. John Gamble's school, 3rd Line, was held on the summer home grounds of Col. Balderson, Christy Lake on Thursday afternoon last, and was the picnic of the year. The attendance was large and encouraging. The section turned out to an individual, and friends outside were there in numbers too. Very Contagious.

It is not generally known that the disease known as spinal meningitis is contagious, highly contagious, many doctors declare; indeed very little is known of it, happily, in this part of the world. But now that it has developed in Kingston it would be well for the greatest care to be taken in isolating cases. People outside those nursing the patient should not be admitted to the sick room, and in case of death there should be a rigid exclusion of all persons who come as sightseers or sympathizers. The truest sympathy and kindness will be found in taking all pains to prevent the spread of this terrible disease, which nearly always means death, and if there is recovery the patient is usually left an imbecile. The first symptoms of the trouble are often those of typhoid fever, and often spots appear on the body. Young children are particularly liable to the disease, but as some people in Kingston know only too well, it attacks those who are in the full flush of the strength of young womanhood. Taking care may save much torture and grief.—Kingston *Whig*
