

Almont: .- Twenty-four business and professional men, supported by the Almonte Gazette, have signed a statement that Local Option has not injured the business of the Town. The seven clergymen of Almonte have signed a declaration that it has been a moral boon to Almonte. This is of more value than newspaper bluff. ,
