Effective Monday next Canadian bakers will be unable to sell sliced loaves, make special bread deliveries or use multicoloured or double wrappers, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board announced Tuesday night,

"The removal of the wheat procession tax announced late last week and these new economies in manufacture and delivery should, in the opinion of the board, render unnecessary and increase in the retail price of bread," a board statement

Starting on Monday of next week and during the first four days of that and succeeding weeks, many of those who made previous contributions to the blood donor service of the Red Cross will go to Ottawa for a second contribution.

Included in those going to Ottawa will be a number who are making their first donation. Recall last week for service for the duration of the war of 1,200 single men who trained for 30 days last fall and winter, was the first run-off from a pool of more than 100,000 available trainees.


